


Luann's Thoughts






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PICTURE BOOK MONTH





Mary Jaime - I Need My Monster by Amanda Noll

Allison Sutton - We Don't Eat Our Classmates by Ryan T. Higgins


This is my new favorite right now. It is a fun read aloud that is silly, cute and has a great ending.
